Ramblings of a Rail Enthusiast

by David Spencer - 1963 Part 4

Sunday 2nd June involved exploring the Snailbeach Light Railway. I travelled via Birmingham Snow Hill to Shrewsbury where I then caught a Midland Red bus to Pontesbury. I mentioned previously that we explored the lower terminus of the SLR at Pontesbury and I used this day to walk the whole line inspecting whatever relics I could find.

Three days later with a mate that introduced me to South Wales, we started a few days of line bashing. Peak D63 took us to Cheltenham and Hymek D7067 on to Cardiff. DMUs took us up to Maerdy and back to Pontypriddd then finally 5601 to Merthyr Tydfil. From there we walked to Rhydrcar Junction to await the daily Dowlais Central freight which duly arrived with 4690 and as it slowed down for the token we jumped onto the brake van for some rare track. We reversed at Pontsticill Junction where we switched from brake van to cab to go up the B&M line to Pant this track bed is now part of the Brecon Mountain Railway.

From Pant it was new track, so after we watched 4690 shunting Dowlais Central yard we went exploring, first to Pantscalliog Halts (High Level) on the Pant line and (Low Level) on the former LNWR MT&A line, then Moriais Tunnel then Dowlais where there was much to see. Two closed stations at Dowlais Top and High Street, then Cae Harris station shed and tin works, and the delightfully named Fosy Fran Junction and Dowlais zigzag Lines junction. Not sure what happened next but we must have descended into Merthyr and train to Treherbert where we changed to a Maesteg train and on through the Rhondda Tunnel. There we found the former Port Talbot Railway station at Neath Road and walked the PTR line to Cwmdu station (closed 1932) where the track finished.

We overnighted in Maesteg and on the Thursday, starting at Neath Road, we began walking the other way until we reached Bryn Tunnel, here we hovered wondering whether to walk through or go round, when 3762 came along light engine (see photo opp) and the crew stopped and offered us a lift all the way down to Duffryn Yard. That saved us a tot of leg work but meant Bryn station and Tynyffon loop were only photographed from the cab.



Being dropped at the shed we looked round before following the PTR to Port Talbot Central, a station that always amazed me. It closed in 1933 and though trackless was totally intact and hidden behind advertising placards. I could never understand how it survived. A bus to Briton Ferry and we made our way to Jersey Park where the dead straight path going up the hill was in fact the Ynysmardy Incline of the South Wales Mineral Railway. We walked up and beyond the park, but not too far, as our plan was to take another bus to Neath and then a train on to Llanelly. 5087 took us from Swansea (High Street), oh for loco hauled Paddington to Milford Haven trains today! 8474 was on the 17.00 Llandovery train, which we took as far as Tirydial (now known as Ammanford) and we returned to Swansea (Victoria) behind 73002 where we found a B&B in Swansea Bay for two nights.

Friday we caught a bus to Ystalyfera and walked up to Gurnos shed and continued alone the then up the Ynvsgedwyn branch where we were lucky to find 6742 shunting, a lovely photo on the River Towy bridge. We walked up to Ystradgyntais station on the Colbren Junction line before we returned to Gurnos and the ex Midland Brynamman line as far as Cwmllynfell where a mineral line shot off over the moorland and we followed this not knowing what would we find. It went from Gwaun-Cae-Gurwen Junction to Gwaun-Cae-Gurwen and apart from one enormous kink a couple of loops and closed collieries there was very little to see. At GCG there was an NCB shed and a couple of industrials and the built but never used viaduct on the GW line. Again we were lucky in that 7213 come storming up from Pantyffynnon, banked by a 67XX. Another bus took us back to Swansea and a fun evening playing pitch and putt and having a paddle! We were hobbling a bit from a lot of walking but as we returned to our B&B, a central Wales train was going into Swansea (Victoria) and I sprinted to get a photo. As my friend said afterwards you move fast for a cripple. Up at 06.15 to walk the Pentrefelin (Glam) to Llandore (Low Level) line including the Midland station at Morriston before breakfast, then a train to Llanelly, haulage by 5054 where we walked the Dafen branch the dock lines and the shed. Although I was no longer an active spotter I kept my books on me and one of my three GW wants was on shed. Another Castle, 5037 back to Swansea continuing by diesel to Bridgend for a trip round the Vale of Glamorgan line and on to Cardiff. Roger went home and I carried on up to Pontypridd and a bus to Old Ynysybwll where I walked down the branch which was unusual in that it ended with an unstaffed halt and had two junctions, track still insitu to Stormstown Junction and trackless to Clydach Court. I did of course cover both before returning to Cardiff.

On Sunday 9th June, my last day, for reasons I cannot recall I went up to Rhymney and walked the closed B&M line again before crossing over the valley to Tir Phil and a train down to Aber Junction. From there I walked to the complex Penrhos Upper and Lower Junctions where three tracks all went off at different levels and at one time one of the great Barry Railway viaducts went over all of them. I took the Barry line and crossed Walnut Tree Viaduct taking great photographs of the Taff Vale before descending down to Taffs Well and a train to Cardiff and Birmingham (see fascinating photo looking slightly to the northwest and now greatly changed today).



Built in 1901, the 517 yard long Walnut Tree Viaduct carried the Penrhos Branch of the Barry Railway 120 feet up across Taff Gap between Garth in the west and Penrhos in the east. The River Taff (just visible on the extreme left behind the house), Taff Vale Railway and Walnut Tree Junction lie below. The TVR still extant today, though just two tracks, runs from Cardiff in the foreground to Pontypridd bearing off to the northwest. Taffs Well station, again still in use can be seen above the road bridge. The first of the two lines bearing off to the right is the Walnut Tree Branch, the second is the Nantgarw Branch, both now footpaths and part of the Taff Trail. Both the Penrhos & Walnut Tree Branches join up at Penrhos Jncts having curved round to the northeast. The road is the A4054 Cardiff Road, still there today but to the right, the A470 has been built which heads up the right hand side of the photo with an industrial estate between it and the TVR. The viaduct was demolished in 1969 with the pier on the eastern bank of the river to the left of David's position (he is standing near the furthest right of the main piers) being one of only two remaining to indicate this structure ever existed....ed

With the closure of Aberdeen Guild Street adjacent the station, now redeveloped as a shopping centre, the freight traffic was split between a new yard 7 miles northwest at Raiths Farm, Dyce on the line to Inverness and a redeveloped yard 1 mile to the south at Craiginches. The existing Blue Circle facility lies to the east of the main line whilst the new two track container handling facility was created to the west from the existing down sidings.

Seen here on the 28th July 2010, DRS 66432 is marshalling the 4N83 MX service due to return south at 18.20 to Grangemouth.

Preservation News

Heritage Shunters Trust, Rowsley (Peak Rail) by Trevor Roots:

Further to my report last month, the roller doors have now been fitted to both ends of the new shed. Also one trackload of shunters were positioned outside allowing a much better photographic opportunity than on my last visit, shame the other line inside was not accessible.

The two reports below are from Mike Rumens, who having ferried a family member to Heathrow on the 12th August then decided to divert on the way home to visit a couple of preserved railways.

Chinnor and Princess Risborough Railway (CPR) by Mike Rumens:

The CPR is based at Chinnor station and appears to be condensed into a very small area. The site was closed and secure it was not possible to see very much with houses being built alongside the railway that restricted the view of the storage areas.

Buckinghamshire Railway Centre (BRC) by **Mike Rumens:**

The BRC is a 25 acre site located at Quainton Road station - a station which was part of the GCR. The single line which runs through the station is not used by the BRC. It is an active NR line for Bin liners to and from the Calvert waste terminal. There is a short section of running line (about a mile) for use on steaming days. BRC is a working steam museum with many exhibits displayed internally and externally either side of the running line. The site was being prepared for a 1940's weekend but it was possible to tour the site with restricted access - effectively anywhere that was open (Cost £3.50)

CARDIFF CENTRAL STATION (CAERDYDD CANOLOG)

Location: OS Map Ref: ST181 758

Cardiff is situated on the southern coast, actually river bank, of Wales. It lies on the northwest bank of the River Severn estuary directly opposite Weston-Super-Mare on the English side 10 miles away. Newport is 10 miles to the east and Bridgend 18 mile to the west. Cardiff is the capital of Wales and is the seat of the Welsh Assembly. Though now a unitary authority, it was formerly in the County of Glamorgan. The River Taff flows from the north through the centre directly past Cardiff Central station and into Cardiff Bay. Two other smaller rivers also empty into the Bay which is about a mile south of the station. The imposing structure of the Millennium Stadium, the national venue for football and rugby union is directly north of the station on the eastern bank of the River Taff.

Access:

Rail: All services in south Wales pass through Central station, which is the hub for the valley lines. Consequently there are frequent services from throughout Wales and many parts of the UK including direct links with Birmingham and London Paddington.

Bus: The main bus station is situated in Central Square on the north side of the station. There is a bus stop on the southern side, referred to as the rear by staff and is used by rail replacement services.

Road: Being on the 'coast' through roads to the west bypass the centre to the north. The M4 which is about 4 miles north connects from the east via Jnct 29 (6 miles from the station) and the A48(M), A48 and other roads (not driven in recently so unsure of exact route). From the west use Jnct 32 and the A470 which leads almost to the station. The A470 being the main artery up the Taff Valley to Merthyr Tydfil and beyond through the heart of Wales to Llandudno on the north coast. There are several car parks adjacent the station including Penarth Road CP on the southeast side and Riverside CP to the northwest. The short stay car park is directly outside the main northern Central Square entrance.

Station Layout:

The station lies on an east – west alignment with the eastern and western approaches curving in from the northeast and northwest respectively. The station is raised above the surrounding area. The River Taff flows beneath the western platform ends, whist the eastern platform ends are above Penarth Road off which both station entrances can be accessed. The main station entrance and ticket hall is located to the north off Central Square and Wood Street with a southern access off Penarth Road. A subway protected by ticket barriers connects both entrances with steps leading up from both sides to three island platforms, 1/2, 3/4 & 6/7 numbered north to south. Platforms 3 and 4 are split into 'a' and b' sections ('a' being furthest west) allowing often two or sometimes three trains to accommodate the long platforms. Another subway containing lifts to the island platforms and a disabled toilet leads only off the main ticket hall. A seventh platform 0 was created on northern side of the station on the Up Relief track and only west of the ticket hall. Access to this platform is from stairs on the western side of the main ticket hall and a ramp. This does mean that you have to go through the barriers between this platform and the other platforms. Step free access is via Riverside car park.

On the northern side of the station either side of platform 0 are two spur tracks, Fish Dock Siding to the west and Up Siding East obviously to the east. Riverside Siding off the Down Barry track on the south side outside of platform is the third spur within the station environs.

There are two additional through tracks, Up and Down Main between platforms 2 and 3 which create four central straight approach tracks through the station. To the east these four tracks run under the twin track Cardiff Queen Street line And single track Cardiff Bay line about 400 yds to the east. The Queen St tracks being the Up and Down Barry lines which access platforms 6/7. To the west of the station beyond the river, the Barry lines and Up Barry Relief from platform 4 curve of south at Cardiff West Jnct as do numerous tracks to Cardiff Canton depot. Further tracks to the depot, ¾ miles distant located in a triangle of lines, also leave the four straight main lines beyond this jnct. The four tracks reduce to two beyond the depot at Leckwith Loop North Jnct.

Freight Traffic:

There are still a number of freights that pass through the station, there being no other route along through south Wales. However the level of traffic is a shadow of its former glory even of only a few years ago. The recession hasn't helped either. Usually in the hands of Cl.66s, with an occasional Cl.60 if you are lucky, the main traffic is coal, largely operated by DBS with some by FL and steel though the latter is much now reduced. The one flow often photographed along its route is the weekday Robeston – Westerleigh Murco oil tanks usually still in the hands of a DBS Cl.60. This operates as 6B13 westbound at 09.35 returning at 19.55 as 6B47. Freights mainly pass through on the centre Up and Down Main though can use any other track.

Passenger Traffic:

The main station operator is Arriva Train Wales with Valley services seeing a regular flow of Cl.142, 143 & 150 and occasional 153 DMUs. Longer distance ATW services are in the hands of Cl.158 & 175 DMUs. Many services are also operated by First Great Western using HSTs, with 3 car Cl.158/9s on the Portsmouth Harbour. Cl.143, 153 & 158s can also be seen. Arriva Cross Country use Cl.170s. Virtually all services pass through the station with the exception of those to/from Treherbert terminating in platform 7 from the east. All long distance services terminating from the east then continue west to cross over to return to other eastbound departure platforms with the exception of the Holyhead set which stables on Canton depot before returning.

Cardiff Central is the only non-electrified station where regular loco hauled services can still be seen throughout the day with Cl. 57/3s and 67s being used on the following 3 long distance services (2 x Cl.67 sets):

Best Spotting / Photography Sites:

Any end of the three island platforms is suitable to view all traffic, though the eastern end guarantees seeing those terminating services from the east. There are various locations for photography depending on the sun and time of day though it is difficult in sunny conditions to photograph services on platform 7.

Railway Globetrotters

Czech Republic, Slovakia and Hungary – Part 1:

A brief history:

Slovakia, as we know it today was part of the Kingdom of Hungary which was formed in the 11th century. The region became an integral part of the Hungarian state until the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire in 1918. Due to conflicts such as the Ottoman wars against the Habsburg Monarchy which resulted in the occupation of Buda§, Bratislava (today's capital of Slovakia) was capital of Hungary until 1848. During the revolution of 1848-49 the Slovaks supported the Austrian Emperor, hoping to gain independence from the Hungarian part of the Dual Monarchy. They failed resulting in relations between the two nationalities deteriorating culminating in the secession of Slovakia from Hungary after World War 1. Buda was on the west bank of the Danube and Pest on the east. These joined to become the Hungarian capital, Budapest.

In 1918, Slovakia and the regions of Bohemia and Moravia formed a common state, Czechoslovakia. Now the Czechs and Slovaks enjoyed a period of relative prosperity, not only in the progress of the development of the country's economy, but in culture and education as well. In 1925, the Locarno Treaties left the East European security open. Then the Great Depression caused a sharp economic downturn. Thereafter, Czechoslovakia came under pressure from the revisionist governments of Germany and Hungary and in 1938 the Munich Agreement allowed Nazi Germany to occupy part of the country known as Sudetenland. This area bordered Germany and Austria. The remainder of the country was renamed Czecho-Slovakia. At the same time, the First Vienna Award allowed Hungary to claim back southern and eastern Slovakia. Next, Nazi Germany threatened to annex part of Slovakia and allow the remaining areas to be partitioned by Poland and Hungary unless independence was declared. This happened in 1939 and Slovakia, in many respects became a German puppet regime.

In April 1945, Slovakia was liberated by Soviet and Romanian forces. After World War 2, Czechoslovakia was reconstituted and in 1948 came under the influence of the Soviet Union and its Warsaw Pact. Towards the end of the Second World War the Hungarian railway system was severely damaged and it took until 1948 to have most of it operable. During the 1956 Hungarian Revolution the railway system escaped serious damage. Hungary is now part of the EU.

In 1969 Czechoslovakia became a federation of the Czech Socialist Republic and the Slovak Socialist Republic.

With the end of Communist rule in 1989, following the Velvet Revolution, this allowed the dissolution of the country for the last time with the Czech Republic and the Slovak Republic going their separate ways. The country was officially dissolved on December 31st 1992. This has sometimes been called the Velvet Divorce. The Czech Republic and Slovakia have remained close partners and both countries co-operate with Poland and Hungary in the Visegrád Group. Slovakia joined NATO and became part of the European Union in 2004, and in 2009 adopted the Euro as its national currency.

The Railway Companies:

Ceské dráhy (Czech Railways) CD:

The company was established in 1993, after the dissolution of Czechoslovakia as a successor of the Czechoslovak State Railways. CD has 9,496km of track, 6,697 bridges and 154 tunnels.

The numbering system today became effective on January 1st 1988 replacing a complex, rather clever system invented by Mr. Kryspin, chief engineer of the locomotive factory Prvni Ceskomoravska Praha in 1921. This applied to electric and diesel locomotives as well as EMUs. Steam locomotives had a class and serial number e.g. 354 7152.

I will try to give a simplified explanation. Take T448 0017. The first letter(s) described the locomotive or unit.

E Electric locomotives DC
M Diesel motor coaches
N EMU centre coaches
R EMU driving trailers
S Electric locomotives AC

From 1st January 1988 a common system was introduced with a 3 digit class number, a 3 digit serial number and a 1 digit European check digit e.g. 000 000-0.

To simplify, only the 1st digit of the first 3 describes the locomotive or unit, eg. 740 017-9.

Now the 1st digit indicates:

0 EMU / DMU centre car EMU motor coach AC 5 Electric locomotive DC 1 6 EMU motor coach dual voltage 7 2 Electric locomotive AC Diesel locomotive 3 Electric locomotive dual voltage 8 Diesel motor coach

9 EMU / DMU driving trailer.

There are many private / industrial locomotives all over the system and many have the same class numbers. However, their serial numbers start 500 upwards.

In 2009 CD announced that it would start to scrap or refurbish all locomotives and coaching stock that were over 40 years old, which accounts for nearly 50% of its current fleet!

Birmingham: The Midland Metro in Birmingham is to be shut down for two weeks due to engineering work in late autumn of this year and in spring 2011.

Blackpool: With the new trams arriving soon in Blackpool some of the older trams are leaving. Number 619 has gone to Heaton Park Tramway, 623 and 702 have gone to Museum of Museums, Trafford Park, Manchester, 712 to Crich Tramway Village, Derbyshire and 716 to Ptarmigan Transport Solutions, Perth.

Gatwick Airport: The new Gatwick Airport Automated Peoplemover is now operational and has six Bombardier Innovia APM 100 cars running as two sets of three. They have rubber tyres and each pod can carry eight passengers with the luggage and can accommodate wheel chairs.

WAGON NEWS:

Freightliner has re-painted one each of its Cl.86/6s & 90's, 86637 & 90045 in the new powerhaul livery as per Cl.70s.

A blow has been dealt to freight plans in the UK with two new freight terminals getting into difficulty. One is ProLogis, who were hoping to turn the abandoned Parkside Colliery site into a rail based warehouse complex and the other, Helioslough which has had its plans refused for a freight terminal at the former Radlett Airfield.

The Donnington Rail Freight Terminal is rapidly filling up with stored multiple units and rolling stock. Rare visitors have been coming through the tunnel like French registered ICA wagon carrying waste oil for re-cycling, its number being 33.87.7995.001.

WAGON REVIEW by Martin Hall:

HAA 32.5t MGR Coal Hopper Wagon

I did a wagon review on this wagon back in 2004 when it was one of the commonest wagons on BR metals but now due to its age and new technologies it has been superseded by the much larger bogie HTA hoppers. In their heyday there were some 10,702 vehicles, but now only 1,247 survive and many of these have been modified. The revolution came when power stations burning coal needed a constant supply of coal and the MGR (Merry-go-round) was born with two experimental wagons 350000 and 350001 both of which have been preserved. The first one 350000 is preserved at the National Railway Museum — Sheldon and the second one 350001 at the Bo'ness & Kinneil Railway. With many of the power stations now closed and the new HTAs being 3 x bigger, fewer wagons are needed to carry the same amount of coal. At first many of the redundant wagon chassis were used to construct new wagons like the MEAs and MHAs but now even this is stopping and many more HAAs are now being scrapped.

As interest I have added some photographs of an incident I recorded on 2nd September 1988 at Trowel Junction, Ilkeston, Derbyshire, when a rake of HAAs de-railed and struck the main road bridge blocking the line for several days, some concertinaed and jammed under the bridge which made it very difficult to clear up. The wagons could have been made of plastic judging by their mangled state.
