EVENTS

There are just three events remaining from our 2022 programme, though Eastleigh will have passed by the time you read this in print. Other venues or additional dates may be added in due course, so for up to date info always check our website. A start is being made on sorting out provisional dates / venues for 2023 (see below) which is our 50th Anniversary, so watch this space.

Pandemic / Hygiene: It is not the time for everyone to get blasé about Covid19 and assume it is ok to catch it. No-one knows the effects the virus can have on individuals and as the average age of members is 65, we are more vulnerable. Many members have underlying health issues and to feel safe we insist that all visit participants must be fully vaccinated up to whatever the current government guidelines state, currently three jabs. For the foreseeable future also please remember to bring a mask as we may be asked to wear them and some may feel safer anyway doing so regardless of guidelines, which still vary throughout the UK. Good idea to bring hand sanitiser as well.

General Booking Conditions: Unless shown otherwise all visits are unlimited. Where limited places the number left is shown in brackets.

Bookings should be made to either Tony Whitehead or Christine Field as stated (if you phone you will most likely get Trevor). Contact details are on p2. Clearly state your name, membership number, and importantly a contact telephone number. If it is for an event with multiple dates eg Carnforth then indicate your preference / availability for the dates shown. Email is best for Tony and he will respond asap. If telephoning Tony please do not call after 20.45 in the evening, as he will be in bed early as he has to be up for work at 04.30 each morning. Best time to ring is after 18.30 weekdays and weekends. Though Tony does not have an answerphone he will return your tel. call promptly if your number is recorded as a missed call, so don't panic. Only if you consistently have any trouble contacting Tony or he hasn't responded after several days then in the last resort contact Christine / Trevor. Note we cannot accept bookings by letter only, as there is no way to quickly contact you if plans are amended at short notice.

Please note no booking / confirmation will be taken if you do not provide full details. As volunteers, neither Tony, Chris or anyone else should have to chase you up if you fail to provide details. It is seconds of your time to get it right but can lead to wasted hours of ours chasing you up if you do not comply. Checking the membership database doesn't always help as it also seems we then find members have not told us about changed telephone numbers or email addresses.

Delay in travelling notwithstanding, please note that there is no excuse for booking then not notifying us you cannot then attend. As with events where numbers need to be accurately known by the hosts for a tour, food or room capacity this is not acceptable. We have tried to ease the official's organising burden and saving you money in postage by allowing members to pay on the day, but this can be abused as it can be then seen as nothing to lose if you can't be bothered to turn up. It may also prevent your place

being offered to someone else. Conversely where numbers permit, we will allow applications right up to the day to be as flexible as possible but do this **by phone only** as officials will be travelling to the event.

Members Only Visits

West Coast Railways, Carnforth - Sat 8th Oct: FULL

Reserve lists in operation. Cost £25.Places are limited to a max of 30 per visit (min 20) as it allows questions to be asked of our guide and prevents getting in each other's way...well not too much!!

The tour will take approx. 3 to 3½ hours so if you are travelling by train please arrange your return accordingly. Needing to leave early can cause problems and we don't want to risk future visits. Entry will be at the main access off Jesson Way (Postcode: LA5 9UR, OS Grid Ref: SD 49128 70057) via the A6 and Crag Bank (mini-roundabout), this is the first bridge over the WCML 1.25 miles south of the station. Start: 10.30 so meet no later than 10.00 at the station (Postcode: LA5 9TR, OS Map Ref: SD 49713 70649) where fee will be taken and clothing bought if required. Those who have arrived by train will be ferried down to the entrance. It is a big site especially when you have gone up and down the various lines, requiring stepping over numerous tracks. Therefore, due to the terrain, distance and pace this visit is not advisable for anyone with mobility problems. However should anyone with mobility problems wish to go then transport can be provided within the site to access the main sheds where most of the locos can be seen. Hi-viz jacket / vest, sturdy footwear and hard hat / bump cap required. All photos taken are for private use ONLY, no public display either online, in magazines or via social media.

FL Crewe Basford Hall Yard – Sat 29th Oct 2022 (later start time) Booking OPEN Apply to Tony Places unlimited (currently 0 attending). Cost £15. The 1 hour trip around Basford Hall Yard starts at 14.00 (meet no later than 13.45) from the main gate just off Gresty Road (Postcode: CW2 5AA, OS Map Ref: SJ 70989 53756) 3/4 mile from the station. On foot turn left from the main station entrance onto Nantwich Road then first left onto Gresty Road, pass Crewe Alexandra FC then left after ½ mile under the railway bridge opposite DRS Gresty Bridge Depot. Hi-viz jacket / vest required.

Eastleigh Works - Sat 10th Sep 2022: Note earlier start

Bookings only by telephone to Christine / Trevor 07765 337700 or 07395 064388

Cost £20 payable on the day or in advance via BACS. The Works is ½ mile south of the station via A335 Southampton Road which runs adjacent the railway (10-15 min walk). Access is via new main gate off Campbell Road opposite NR building, which is beyond where the lefthand footpath starts. (Postcode: SO50 5AD, OS Map Ref: SU 45661 18367). Only disabled car parking by the entrance, all other parking of site. The Swan Centre multi-storey car park is between the station and Campbell Road (Postcode: SO50 5PB). Please arrive by 13.00 at the latest with a start at 13.30. The fee covers the normal Arlington visit fee (which they donate to charity) and organising stewards. You will get access to all areas until 6.30 and cab rides...locos TBC. Hi-viz jacket / vest required. It is a deceptively big site, especially when you have gone up and down the various lines and inside Works roads so be prepared to walk. The Works canteen will be open to purchase refreshments and our sales stand will be there to purchase books / sundries (card payments now accepted).

66850 arrived on 10/08 for minor repairs, departing 12/08

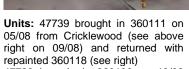
70802 arrived on10/08 for power unit swap (see above on 23/08)

FRANCHISE / NETWORK NEWS

At last some of our TOCs are to be operated by a UK based company, Transport UK Group, as Abellio UK is the subject of a management buyout from parent company Nederlandse Spoorwegen. The new company will take over ownership of EMR and the stakes in WMT, GA and Merseyrail. Completion of the deal should be by the end of 2022, subject to agreement by various parties.

Elizabeth Line: From the 6th November services are to run directly between Abbey Wood and either Heathrow or Reading and from Shenfield to London Paddington.



GC: The fleet of CI.180s has become increasingly misformed (see STOCK CHANGES) after various incidents and maintenance with six of the ten units affected. Five vehicles are currently at Ilford for repairs forming a nominal set 180103 (50912, 54907, 55906, 56903, 59905). Hopefully the correct formations will resume once all are back in service.

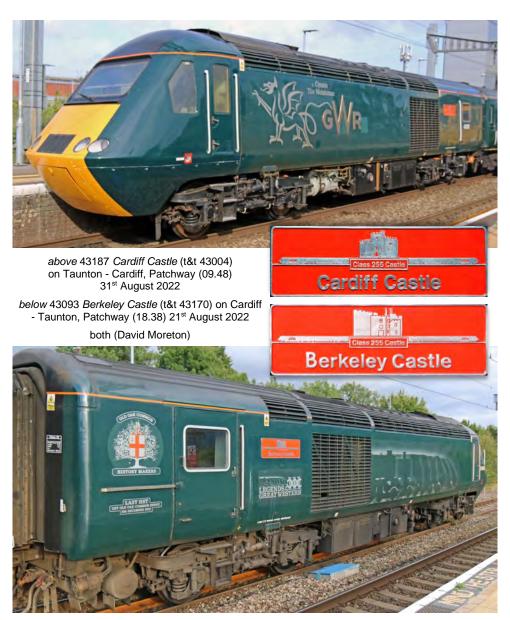
GN: As reported in the last issue the photo left by Graham Stockton shows 387302 + 387301 at Peterborough on the 1st September 2022, now with great Northern branding

SR: The last pair of SR Cl.455/8s headed to the scrapyard just as the last issue went to press.



above hauled by 69001, the first time a Cl.69 has been used for stock haulage, 455804 + 455819 on their final journey to Sims Metals, Newport Docks as 5Q55 from Stewarts Lane, Reading (13.29) 16th August 2022 (Spencer Conquest)

GWR: The naming of the HST Castle sets has been completed with the last five of 35 operational power cars being named. 34 have Castle names, 43004/05/09/10/16/22/27/29/40-42/88/92-94/97/98, 43122/53-56/58/60/62/70-72/86-89/92/94 with 43198 the only named exception. Surprisingly celebrity 43093 has lost its Old Oak Common nameplates but retained all the other graphics celebrating the closing of Old Oak Common Depot and the Legends of the Great Western. 43187 has gained a Castle name but retained its special 'Y Cymro The Welshman' dragon livery, which is looking a bit careworn. See **STOCK CHANGES** for the names on 43009/88 (43027 yet to be illustrated).



DRS: In another twist the latest sale / lease back lists have been withdrawn whilst 66301-05 are now stored at Crewe Gresty Bridge pending transfer back to Beacon Rail and re-deployment to GBRf.

Eurostar: The direct service to Disneyland Paris will cease from the 6th April 2023 with the company citing economic conditions and logistical problems caused by Brexit. The later also means no services will call at Ebbsfleet Int or Ashford Int for the next two years.

NR: The success of using Cl.153s as video survey units has prompted NR to expand the fleet with 153376/84 extracted from Long Marston and initially moved to Millennium Site Services near RTC Derby MSS specialise in bodywork repair and preparation.

KEIGHLEY & WORTH VALLEY RAILWAY VISIT REPORT

With a length of only 4% miles KWV is a relatively short line in West Yorkshire but is the entire Keighley to Oxenhope branch line preserved in 1968 after closure by BR in 1962. Though a picturesque line worthy of being visited in its own right, KWV has both encouraged locals to use the line to avoid the congested adjacent valley roads but been lucky in that just after the line re-opened one of the most famous railway films, The Railway Children released in 1971, was based on the line and used its stock. With a sequel also featuring the line released in 2022, the draw for film fans continues to bring in much needed support and revenue. All the photos are taken on the 19th August 2022 unless shown otherwise.

There are six stations with the northern terminus at Keighley giving a mainline connection. KWV operates from platforms 3 & 4 (though 3 is seldom used) with mainline services on the Airedale line using platforms 1 & 2. There is a turntable originally located at Garsdale and a signal box, moved from Shipley Bingley Jnct. There is a siding running through the turntable on which wagons are stabled.

The next station 11/4 miles down the line is single platformed Ingrow West which houses Rail Story, cleverly highlighted from the full title Railway History. This is a collaboration between KWV, the Vintage Carriages Trust and the Bahamas Loco Society with two museums to explore. The Carriage Works and The Engine Shed respectively, containing both stock and artefacts. A joint

admission ticket only costs £5 (adult), £4 (concession), £3 (child 5-16) or free if travelling with a rover ticket. The station building is from Foulridge which replaced the heavily vandalised original. Together with a coach located alongside the station used for educating schoolchildren about railways, there are a couple of sidings which usually house wagons and a crane.

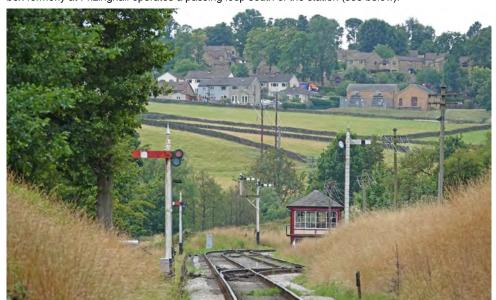

having come from Oakworth we chose what we thought was a shorter route to park and walk down...next time it will be the track to drive up to the level crossing

The next station Damens is the smallest in the UK as though others are smaller, they are halts, but Damens had its own stationmasters house so qualified as a station. With a level crossing at the southern end, the single platform is only one carriage long and is a request stop and is the least accessible by

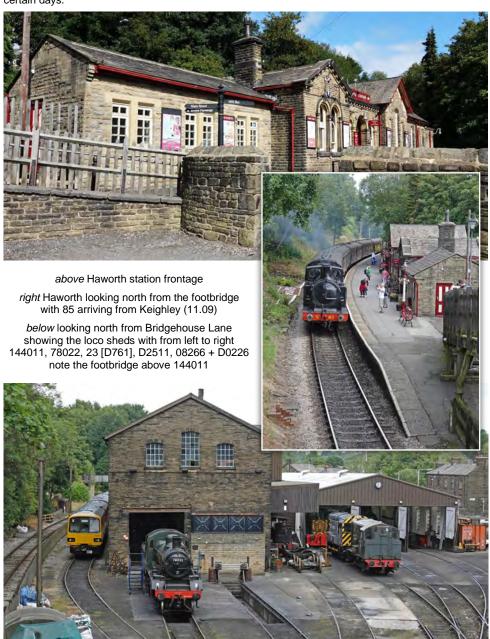
vehicles with no parking. On the platform is a signal box from Earby (see opposite bottom) whilst another box formerly at Frizinghall operates a passing loop south of the station (see below).





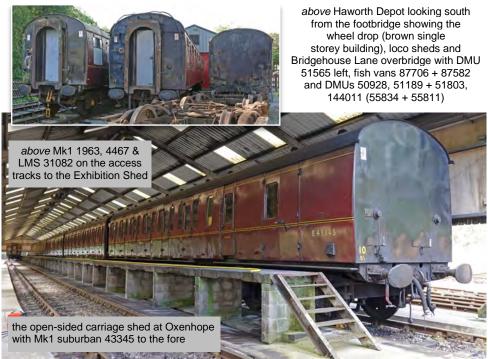


The next station Oakworth (see previous page) is arguably to most non railway enthusiasts the most well-known as it featured heavily in The Railway Children and kept its name rather than be fictionalised. There is a level crossing at the south of the platform, with a loading dock, goods shed housing a LNER 5t crane small yard and a couple of sidings to the north. The loading dock had an assortment of wagons whilst the siding was occupied by engineers wagons. The Goods Shed latter now features in tours on certain days.



The penultimate station on the line is Haworth (see opposite and below), 3½ miles from Keighley, the KWV admin centre and home to the loco fleet with a running shed and works, both of which can be visited through guided tours as we did. For non-railway visitors it is famous as being the home of the Bronte sisters from 1820.

The southern terminus at Oxenhope houses the carriage sheds with an extended goods shed used for restoration whilst an open-sided shed houses the operational fleet (see above and opposite). Stored locos awaiting their turn in the overhaul queue are housed along with some historic coaches in the Exhibition Shed which is free to visit (see above top).

The best place to park if visiting by car is Oxenhope which is free, as is Ingrow West, with pay & display parking at Haworth. There is a small car park at Oakworth.

We, as did other members, started our day at Oxenhope in order to see the first service depart north behind 0-6-2T 85, get the Exhibition Shed done first and try our luck with getting around the carriage sheds. With half a dozen of us gathered together, a very helpful KWV volunteer agreed to give us a guided tour of the open sided shed and small yard. The restoration shed was not included as too narrow and congested, a point I had found out when originally asking if this could be included in our visit. None the less what we saw was a real bonus. Some coach numbers could be viewed through the station facing windows of the restoration shed. With a sunny and warm day in prospect though a bit breezy at times at 10.30 we then headed for Haworth, only 5 mins north where we looked around for breakfast, settling on Bronte Bridge Café just above the station. Whilst there 85 returned south at 11.10.

Notwithstanding that hiccup we started our tour near enough on time with guides Philip Balmworth and David Pearson, the latter giving us a interesting spiel on the history of the railways. Being a self-avowed steam buff, he was amazed at the interest in diesels especially when 20031 passed south on a PW train...he couldn't get over the number being diligently logged by Barry Knibbs!!

Initial talk over at 12.15 we split into two groups guided by David and Philip and worked our way around the loco shed, workshop and small yard without the need to rush, so that after just over an hour we were able to see everything comfortably and ask questions. We even managed to see 20031 returning to the yard (see left).

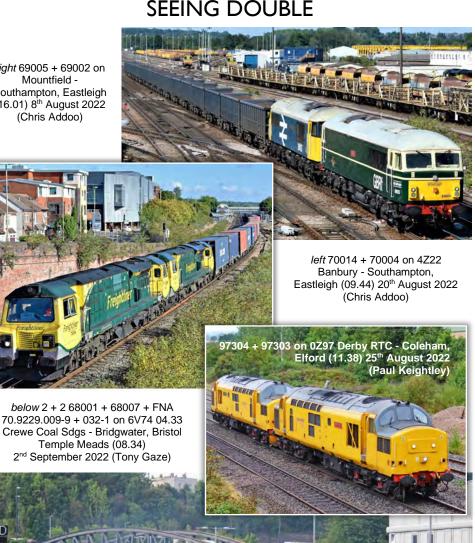


Having stayed at Keighley Travelodge on the Thursday evening, ½ mile away from the station, meant that had already been visited, so at this point it was a case of visiting the remaining two stations not previously seen, Oakworth and Damens. Those seen it was onto Ingrow West for

We headed to Embsay where we managed to get a guided tour around the sheds and yard. We followed this by tea and cake then at 16.50 we headed to Bury. Prior to an evening meal next to the TL, we intended a visit to photograph around Bolton Street from the footbridge and Baron Street, vantage points not included in our tour, which would have been helpful in identifying stock not seen. However, this was thwarted when booking (18.30) as we told it was eat now or never, with big parties due at our intended later time of 19.30. What was annoying is the groups never materialised with the restaurant half empty when we left.

EAST LANCS RAILWAY VISIT REPORT

The East Lancs Rly (ELR) is on most enthusiast's bucket lists of must see preservation sites to visit, as the stock list is wide ranging and vast. It is also difficult to see most of the stock without a guided tour. With the pandemic having prevented us from organising any follow up visits since our last over 4 years ago, it was great that we managed to fit in one visit for the 20th August 2022, though with a max of 20 participants allowed it was highly sought after.

A pretty comprehensive report with many photos from our AGM visit on the 10th March 2018 was covered in the **TRACKS** *extra* Spring 2018 issue so I won't repeat that info.

After all the hot weather the forecast for the day initially promised some rain but in the end it was fine and warm with the odd dampness in the air. Even the sun came out eventually. I as did others arrived

early enough to catch the first two departing services from Bury Bolton Street at 09.00. These were 45108 to Heywood and 2-6-4T 80097 to Rawtenstall, the latter arriving completely blanketed in its own steam. After some crossed wires as to where we were to start the tour at the planned time of 09.30, we were on platform 2 whilst our guide John was expecting us at Baron Street, we eventually started at 10.10 with 20 members by now eager to get going. In fact because of the delay we saw 45108 return from Heywood which then departed for Rawtenstall at 10.10, a good job as I forgot to get the rake of coaches first time!





Our first point of call off the end of platform 2 was the Bury Standard 4 Group Shed (see opposite bottom) which now housed the chassis of Ivatt 2-6-0 46428 with the boiler outside. Next after crossing the tracks to Heywood was Bury South signal box with assorted stock stabled alongside (see above top). From here tracks lead past Buckley Wells Carriage Shed to Baron Street Loco Works and main yard. Passing stock on the siding to the west of the running tracks (see above) we entered the carriage shed where we were given info on ongoing restoration projects by one of John's colleagues (see below and opposite top).





From here we had a look round stored stock to the west of the shed before crossing Baron Street to the main loco works and yard. After viewing locos on the western side of the shed (see below) we then circumnavigated the large yard, almost seeing all stock bar a handful of items on the two most westerly tracks (beyond the track headed by 33109). From here we went back through the eastern half of the loco works then viewed stock outside adjacent the eastern side.

The 1 hour 50 min tour, after the initial hiccup, went off smoothly so thanks to our guide John He did though have to deal with one member wearing shorts who snagged his leg on brambles near the end of our tour. Hopefully we will try to get more visits booked in for 2023.

Though not included in the tour those who wanted to, then visited Castlecroft Works and Bury Transport Museum. There were a couple of wagons outside the Works which was closed and probably contained D1041 & D7076. In the Museum, admission price of £5, was 4-6-2 60009 which has been shoehorned in on permanent display following its retirement displacing a couple of wagons, RNAD 277 and PCY 12. As the other railway items were similar to our previous visit, I spent all of 5 mins getting the necessary shots of 60009 so a £1 a min !! There were four wagons in the yard and after researching my photos from our AGM visit in 2018 deduced that two are those ejected from inside having been repainted in LNWR grey but now carrying fictitious numbers (see Stock List above). The other two wagons are also carrying fictitious numbers.

DAYS OUT

Newcastle by **Peter Ventham:** With a new fleet due imminently and nine of the existing Tyne & Wear Metro units remaining to be 'bashed' (needed for travelling on) I decided to head north to Newcastle, making arrangements to stay the night. I also thought that I would also have a look at finding a couple of BR Mk1 coaches at South Shields listed in ICRS books plus an LMS coach. I did a bit of research to find the coaches at the Marsden Rattler and worked out where to go although the information on Google Maps turned out to be inaccurate, mainly because the pub had been renamed, but more of that later...looks like I need to re-code these coaches, ed.

The Tyne and Wear Metro runs two service groups from South Hylton to Newcastle Airport and South Shields to St James via Whitley Bay. The two lines share a common route from Pelaw to South Gosforth. There has been quite a large amount written recently about the Metro System so I will not reiterate that here. There are a few things about the Metro that have not appeared, or should I say that I have not seen that will help people going to see the units and stock on the Metro. Firstly the Metro cars themselves of which there are 90. The two prototypes 4001/02 along with 4040/83 have not been refurbished so only normally appear in the peaks. There appears to be just two of the four working at any time. British Tram Fleets also show two trams withdrawn and now used as Driver Trainers at South Shields. There are two depots and a training school on the Metro. The depots are at South Gosforth and at Howden, with the training school at South Shields. There is also a P-way yard close to the depot at Howden.

I planned to travel to Newcastle on 13th June 2022, staying overnight and coming home on the 14th June. I was not in a rush having all day to travel up to Newcastle to arrive in time for the evening peak about 15.00. The following day I would get up and come down to the Leeds area to tidy up some units round there. I aimed to get the 07.30 King's Cross to Newcastle, however this was not to be. The 06.02 from my home station was delayed by 50 minutes owing to overrunning engineering work so I eventually arrived at London Waterloo at 07.43. On arrival at King's Cross, I had a look to see if any of my IETs were about then checked out what northbound departures there were, the first available being the 10.03 to Leeds. So having booked a seat I then went and had some breakfast followed by a quick look at St Pancras International.

I zipped north to Leeds on 801230, where I changed trains picking up 195106 on the 12.30 to York. I then caught 802202 on the 13.05 to Newcastle arriving at about 14.10. I made my way to the Metro and caught a train to South Shields getting out at Chichester to see the coaches at the Marsden Rattler. The little pin on Google maps was only about one and a half miles out. I asked a taxi driver if he knew where they were and I was pointed to the coast.



The name of the pub has been changed to Platform 33. The three coaches were there, one at the front on Sea Road and two at the rear of the property with the centre covered over to make the seating and bar area. Mk1 TSO 4751 is at the front. At the rear is LMS coach 11937 in use as a kitchen, in line with Mk1 TSO 3743. The end of this pokes out the end but there is a wall going the whole length of the 11937 and the Mk1 which prevents a view from the sea side of the pub. I nipped in for a drink to see what had been done to the inside (see above). One wall of 4751 has been removed with a entrance built at both ends, one being an emergency exit. The underframe of this coach looks complete as does the LMS coach. Opposite 4751, inside there is a second bar which is in the shell of 3743 which also has one side completely removed. There is a rear entrance door also cut into the side of 3743 which leads to the

beach. Along from here is the LMS coach full of kitchen equipment, which is just a shell and underframe with two large chimneys on the roof.

From here I walked to the Town Centre. I wanted to look at the training centre. From the current South Shields entrance, walk straight over the road following the railway and keeping it to the left. Cross another road and in front are some boarded up public conveniences, go right round these and behind them is a walkway under the railway. Take this and on reaching the far side you will see a car park on the right with a footpath going outside the fence. Follow this and the path starts to rise with the Training School on the right. Inside the building were two Metro cars. 4060 and 4062. They should have been 4055 and 4062. I'm not sure where 4055 was as I continued up the path and it was not in the back yard. The numbers can be read quite easily but you might have to move some of the foliage out of the way.

I made my way back to the station and caught a train to Pelaw which also has the advantage of being adjacent the Newcastle to Sunderland mainline. Apart from the Metro units detailed below I saw Cl.156 / 158s working on the Newcastle to Sunderland Line plus GC Cl.180s ecs between Heaton and Sunderland to start their workings to King's Cross.

I stayed at Pelaw for some of the peak until a couple of my units came round. The trains are all numbered in a similar way to London Underground, as in the trains have a number allocated, lit up on the front and depending on which line the trains run on. The numbers are:

You therefore know when you have seen all the units operating. Note that after the evening peak some of the daytime trains also come out of service. I did not see all the trains having taken longer to get to Pelaw than planned, however a total of 57 were seen working.

I managed to get 4 of my 9 units. As a result, I decided to stay in Newcastle for the morning peak. I left the hotel at 08.00 and again made my way to Pelaw. I saw all but two trains with 77 seen. I managed to get another two units, leaving me with just three, un-refurbished 4002, refurbished 4017 and trainer 4062.

After a successful evening and morning I left Newcastle hauled by 801206, one I needed. I found out that 802206 was working which was my last TransPennine IET, so I caught a train to Huddersfield to take it back to Leeds. I had some time at Leeds so went for a couple of pints before heading home with 801203, leaving me with just 13 East Coast IET's to track down.

Altogether a quite successful two days.

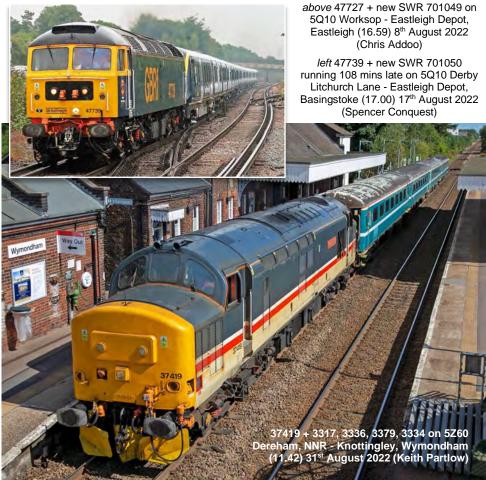

Snowdon Rly: Though the reasons have not been divulged, the two new hybrid Clayton locos 14 & 15 built in 2019 (see p35 Oct 2020 issue) will not be entering service.

INDUSTRIAL STEAM LOCO SURVEY

Now included in our spotting books this series looks at the varied small industrial steam locos.

AB 0-6-0ST 3 [1458]: Built in 1916 by Andrew Barclay for the Ministry of Munitions Houston. Georgetown near Paisley. In 1919 it was sold to the Lothian Coal Co. and operated until 1978 at Newbattle Colliery also known as Lady Victoria Colliery, Newtongrange south of Edinburgh. it passed to NCB Area 2 (Lothians) in 1947 who donated the loco on withdrawal to the Scottish Railway Preservation Society (SRPS) who are based at Bo'ness & Kinneil Rly (BKR) where it has remained until recently. In March 2021 it moved to its former stamping ground of Newtongrange, now the Scottish Mining Museum (SMM), having been cosmetically restored and re-liveried with 'NEWBATTLE COLLIERIES' branding.



Retaining its number 3 throughout, it was named 'LADY VICTORIA' in 1988 at the Glasgow Garden

Festival.

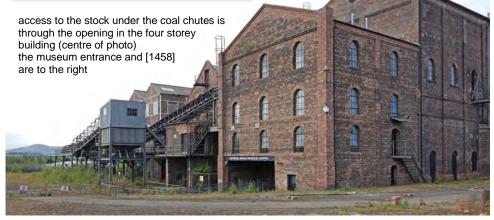

PRESERVATION NEWS

Wensleydale Rly (WEN): A year on from arriving at Leeming Bar, 0-6-0DE WL4 [804] has lost its Great Eastern Traction (GET) blue livery (see below left) in favour of its original yellow livery. Built in

55032 (121032), Leeming Bar 18th August 2022 1978 by Brush for the Tyne & Wear Metro, it moved to TML for Channel Tunnel construction work then to Insulated Services, Round Oak Steel Terminal before acquisition by GET. Meanwhile 121032 (55032) is nearly ready to return to service after repairs to its damaged roof and a repaint into fresh BR green (see left) whilst Pacer 143623 is receiving a repaint into Regional Railways livery (see below).

03078 has been hired by EMB from SRM for the remainder of 2022 as seen below at Embsay on the 18th July 2022.

An interesting dilemma has occurred with the ongoing story of Castle 4-6-0 7027 THORNBURY CASTLE which was sold by Jonathon Jones-Pratt to the GCR on the understanding it was to be restored but has now been sold on to the 4709 Night Owl project. The latter need a suitable boiler which 7027 can provide, albeit a Swindon No.8 rather than a No.7 as fitted. This negates the need to spend £800,000 building a new boiler or refurbishing a smaller No.1 boiler from 2861. a 'Barry Ten' loco. The smaller boiler also helps in the requirement to keep the loco within the current NR loading gauge. However, Jonathon Jones-Pratt has stepped in and a petition started to save 7027 but as usual a leaked report of the sale did not give the full facts and the petition is mis-guided. The loco has always been a source of spares, initially for the



restoration of 5043 EARL OF MOUNT EDGCUMBE, but it is intended that as well as enabling 4709 to be completed, another missing GWR class can be created from the frames of 7027. This is a 1930s 4000 class 4-6-0 Star similar to the 'stuffed' 4003 LODE STAR but one that will be operational with outside steam pipes, 4003 having been converted to inside and using the now spare boiler from 2861.

The conversion will however be done in such a way that 7027 could still be resurrected as a Castle if another boiler became available.

Vintage Trains based at Tyseley has bought 37240 from Neil Boden, doubling their mainline registered diesel fleet and will eventually be repainted into BR green. It also appears that only one of the three CI.144s acquired in Dec 2021 will be retained.



Dean Forest Rly (DFR) by **Nigel Benning:** Having been a guest since January, railcar 79900 departed the DFR seven months to the day on the 26th August 2022, as seen above at Lydney Jnct, heading for the Great Central Railway. It is due to feature in the GCR Diesel Running weekend (2nd - 4th Sep) and Railcar & Branchline Weekend (9-11th Sep). A forthcoming filming

contract at DFR required GWR Small Prairie 2-6-2T 5541 to be turned. This was undertaken on the 9th September 2022 by loading it onto a lorry, which then did a three-point turn, before off-loading the loco. In the photo above, 5541, which now faces south, is seen descending from the lorry. The loco will stay this way round for now, which will even out flange wear as well as providing different photo opportunities.

LLR is once again having difficulties with both the Heads of the Steam and Motive Depts resigning resulting in steam operation being suspended until suitable replacements could be found. The situation then resolved itself and with resident 2-8-0 2802 still under repair, a replacement steam loco has been hired in, Austerity 0-6-0ST WD75091 [1752] running as 68067 normally based on the CGR. Going

forward, environmental, coal supply and cost of living pressures will limit the amount of steam operation in future seasons. There is likely to be only 60-70 days with just two locos required.

RAIL TOUR NEWS

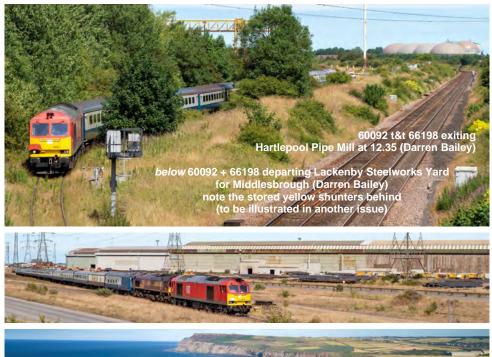

In total over £200,000 has been raised over the five tours. The tour utilised locos from DBC and FL with stock 6054, 6067, 1212, 5961, 6051, 3340, 3278, 1657, 3304, 6310, 17105. The first leg was from Doncaster to Tees Yard with 70016 + 66955 t&t 66010. On arrival at Tees Yard the lead locos were replaced by 60092 for the trip to Hartlepool Pipe Mill with 66010 then

leading, where the train reached the buffer stops inside the mill. The tour continued onwards to Lackenby Steelworks where it was hauled by RR 0-6-0DH [10255] with 66010 removed in favour of 66198. After a servicing break at Middlesbrough, 66094 replaced 60092 to run to Redcar Bulk Terminal with 66198 then hauling the tour back to Doncaster.

PRESERVATION GALAS

Ecclesbourne Valley Rly (EVR) Diesel Gala by **Sean Davies:** EVR held its Diesel Gala over the weekend 5-7th August 2022 and I attended on the Friday. This was my first visit to the EVR so I was looking forward to riding a new line and seeing some new locos. Rather poor connections at Derby meant I was hanging around there for 50 minutes, though there are worse places to be stuck. I got a few EMR CI.222s and units while awaiting the CI.156 to Duffield. The heat was already getting a

bit much when I arrived at Duffield and crossed to the adjoining EVR platform. Sitting there waiting were D1842 and bubble car 55032. I was glad to be riding the bubble as they are quite iconic vehicles. A rover ticket cost £25 which wasn't too bad for a gala day and all funds help the railway.

There was a 'driver for a fiver' at Wirksworth station with 4wDH [188C] (see left).

It was interesting to see lots of younger volunteers than you normally see at heritage lines. Maybe it's the diesels that attract them. Have to admit I'm a diesel man rather than steam, having not been born when steam ended. The line is picturesque, travelling through the Derbyshire landscape. The timetable wasn't as intense as some galas, I suspect due to the lack of passing points on the line and was pretty much kept to all day, which was good as the day got hotter and hotter. The trains were quite lightly loaded, possibly due it being a Friday, the heat or the cost of living.

I thoroughly enjoyed doing the Ravenstor Incline with 73001 + DMU 51505, a fun bit of track (see right). There was plenty of stock in the yard at Wirksworth but unfortunately nobody was available to show me around.

The LMS 10000 project was continuing at a steady pace and members were available to talk.

A nice railway with friendly, enthusiastic volunteers and a line that I would like to return to, but on a cooler day next time!

Spa Valley Rly (SPA) Diesel Gala by **Sean Davies:** SPA held their Diesel Gala over the weekend 12-14th July 2022 and gave me an opportunity to visit after a few years away. I attended on the Friday on another crazily hot day. Trains were lightly loaded which I can only put down to the heat putting people off. Although as there was a strike on the Saturday and Sundays are never great to travel, I was surprised more people weren't there. All trains seemed to run smoothly. The timetable was a bit fluid which aided people arriving at Eridge National Rail Station and queuing for SPA tickets with a Rover costing £30, which seems to be the average now what with the price of fuel.

Like the EVR, there were lots of enthusiastic younger volunteers out for the diesel gala. It is great to have this heritage line so close to London yet far enough away to be in the countryside, a nice line to travel any time of year.

The shed at Tunbridge Wells West was open to walk around and see the many locos being repaired / refurbished. There were also a few groups with stalls present.



There were two coach sets running, one with a bar on, which I unfortunately never managed to find

myself on! There was also the 4ClG 1497 running between Groombridge and Tunbridge Wells West, being hauled / pushed by 73141 + 73140, the former Cl.73 supplied by GBRf and the latter resident having lost its NSE livery for plain BR blue (see below). Also running was DEMU Thumper 1317.



I really enjoyed travelling on the mixture of loco hauled and DEMU. Also, in service were D5054 *PHIL SOUTHERN* (courtesy of ELR) and resident 31430 *Sister Dora* (see right) neither of which I had seen before, so it was good to see and ride behind them. Also running was D7612 (courtesy of SDR) and resident 33063 *R.J.Mitchell Designer of the Spitfire*. I discovered the footbridge at Groombridge so managed to get a couple of shots from there, a good location for photography. Another good day out and well done to all at SPA for the organising and putting the event on in very challenging weather conditions.

Yoker Depot by **Ray Bond:** We had 3 day trip in March 2022 to Scotland during which we, myself and fellow member Michael Delaney, ventured out to Yoker Depot to try and see Mk3 coaches 10256 and 10260 that are listed as there. Using google maps we could see the two coaches were located behind the depot appearing to be not rail connected. On passing the depot on the train the coaches could be glimpsed surrounded by trees, I think once the leaves are back on the branches the coaches would not be seen. We took the train back to Garscadden Station from where the following directions produce the views in the photos below, all taken by myself from public vantage points.



Ascend the stairs from the platform and turn left onto the footbridge and follow the path to the end, then turn right into Kinellar Drive. Follow this road round to the left and at the junction turn right onto Craggon Drive. Walk to the end of this road which brings you out opposite the entrance to Yoker Depot. It was from the entrance of the depot I took the photo above of the blue liveried sides of 10260 nearest and 10256 furthest.

At the end of Craggon Drive turn left onto Dyke Road and walk up to the old railway bridge that used to span a line that ran down to the side of the River Clyde, as you reach the bridge there are steps down to the old railway which is now a footpath. Walk under the railway bridge and towards the fenced sports field. From the fence the virgin liveried side of the coaches and their numbers are clearly visible as seen below.

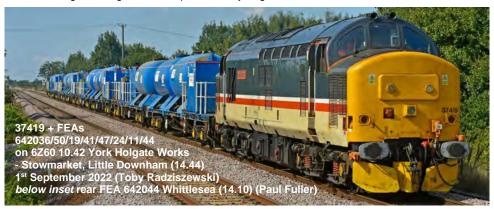

RAILWAY GLOBETROTTERS

Chasing trains around Phoenix, Arizona USA by Colin Pottle - Part 1:

I was always of the opinion that British railways were the best around, and like so many other enthusiasts in this country, foreign countries were not worth bothering with! When you really think about it though, the British invented railways and they work on the same principles all over the world, so by this reasoning could be classed as British. In fact, this trip turned out to be a real eye opener, in some ways really putting our railways over here to shame. In a strange twist of fate, most diesels now running in this country were designed and built by General Motors, Electro-Motive Division, an American company!

This American trip was being planned over two and a half years ago, but as with so many other things on the world stage, Covid put paid to it, and it was not until January of 2022 that rules were relaxed enough to allow it to commence Therefore myself and three fellow travellers grabbed at the chance before the rules changed again with twelve days from the 20th March – 1st April. There were still hurdles to be overcome before we even left the ground at Heathrow, however. We all had to have a Covid lateral flow test in order to receive a 'Fit to Fly' certificate, so we allowed extra time in order to fit this in, arriving at Heathrow at about 10.30 to be tested at 11.00. Our flight was due to leave at 14.15, plenty of time, or so we thought. British Airways, in its wisdom, had laid off most of their staff and there were just three check-in desks manned for the whole of the US flights that day! We joined the queue and waited and waited...by the time we got to the check in desk the flight had closed, much to the annoyance of us and the few hundred passengers behind us trying to check in to flights all over the USA. Eventually BA saw sense and re-opened the flights, delaying them by an hour or so and we were able to check in and be settle in for the eleven hour flight.

Phoenix is the capital of Arizona, a state in the southwest of the USA between California to the west and New Mexico to the east and bordering Mexico to the south. Upon arrival, there were no problems with customs and we sailed through the airport to the car rental area where we picked up a Toyota Highlander, roomy enough for all of us and the luggage. We were booked into a motel for the first night, one of the stipulations of flying to the states is that you have the address of where you are going to stay. After grabbing a bite to eat we found the motel and retired for the night, exhausted, but glad to be there.

A few things to note about US railways. The railways themselves are owned by the various freight companies that maintain them. There are very few passenger services so in the two weeks we were there we only saw one passenger train and that was a tourist one going to the Grand Canyon, the line owned by the Grand Canyon Railway. This also means that freight has priority over everything else. The signalling is slightly different as well. Signals are few and far between, most trains being operated by radio, which means trains stop in the middle of nowhere, especially when the drivers' hours run out. There are dirt tracks next to most of the lines to enable staff to drive to stranded trains in order to get relief drivers to and from trains. A lot of the time the signals are blank, meaning there is nothing coming in either direction. When the signal is red, a train is coming from the opposite direction and green means a train is coming in that direction. It has to be remembered that all lines are bi-directional as well, so things can get confusing. The lines are also checked most mornings by staff using railroaders. You may be sitting in a perfect place, sun, location, no trains, then along comes a vehicle which gets off the main line at the next railroad crossing and the trains follow one after another once the member of staff has radioed through that the track is all clear.



The plan was to drive south from Phoenix and pick up the Sunset Route which runs from Los Angeles (LA) in California to New Orleans in Louisiana, a main line run by Union Pacific. From there, we were

aiming to travel clockwise around Phoenix. As always, things don't quite go according to plan as we shall see.

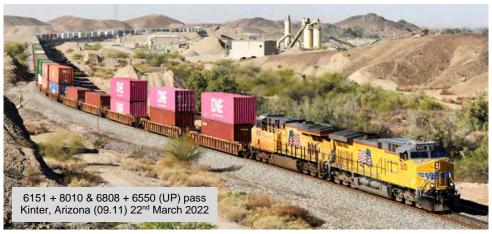


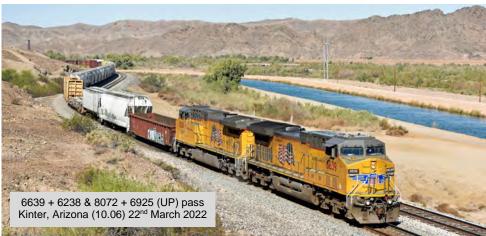




Day 1 - Monday 21st March 2022:

Headed due south from Phoenix and found the Sunset Route at Mobile. From there we made our way westwards to Gila Bend and passed through Mohawk Valley and Kinter ultimately ending up in Yuma, around 30 miles from the Mexican border, where we found a motel, just. Apparently, there were a lot of military manoeuvres and they had booked up most of the hotels in the area. We also found that Americans don't like to stay up late, and most eateries are closed by 21.00. Luckily, a Chinese buffet was still open. As there was nowhere else to stay in this area, we decided to stay for a second night to explore the canyons around Kinter and booked the motel accordingly. This allowed us to leave our luggage in the room and travel light the following day.









Day 2 - Tuesday 22nd March 2022:

We spent all day exploring Kinter and Dome. As the lines twist and turn to get through the mountains and canyons there is always somewhere to set up and get the light in the right direction, moving to the next place a few miles along the line. Another thing to note about the light, from about 14.30, the sun doesn't move around, it just drops. You may get four hours or so in one place. On the way back to the motel we saw a train heading towards LA and chased it to a railroad crossing we had seen just outside Yuma. I got one of my favourite shots from the entire holiday there, with the Fortuna Foothills in the background (see below).

The first of a batch of 50 JNA box wagons for GBRf, 81.70.5932.750-799 has been completed at Greenbrier, Romania.

Maritime Transport has been granted a lease from Associated British Ports to operate Hams Hall from the 3rd July 2022.

The report in the last issue mentioning that the DBS mail coaches had been moved into the sheds adjacent Hellifield Station.
